EASTER SUNDAY

April 12, 2020

John 20:1-18

It's a day to tell stories – stories about miracles and about new life, stories worth retelling. It's a day to tell this story. Before dawn, Mary, a grieving friend of Jesus went to the place where they had laid his body. She did not find the body there. She called for the others. They came and also saw the empty tomb. Some of them went away, distressed, suspecting vandals, but Mary stayed behind. Then and there she encountered the living Christ.

There's a lot of miracle to uncover in this story. There's the miracle of a woman in grief going to a tomb, only to find it empty. The miracle of the strength she found to continue to search. The miracle of Jesus' appearance, so changed that he was, at first, unrecognizable. The miracle that it was her word (the word of a woman, whose testimony was not even at the time admissible in a court of law) that was heard and believed by the other disciples. The miracle that, in spite of all the ways throughout history in which women's voices have been silenced, that it was Mary's words that ring down through the years, "I have seen the Lord!"

But all those miracles can overshadow the very first miracle of the story, which is contained in one small phrase. It's so very small, in fact, that you might have missed it. "Early on the first day of the week and *while it was still dark*, Mary Magdalene went to the tomb..."

Did you catch it?

While it was still dark. Mary left her home before the sun was up. A dangerous time. A cold time. And in that cold, dangerous time, that time when there was only confusion, no hope at all, the resurrection of Jesus had already happened! A miracle.

It is a cold and dangerous time for many of us – in our own lives, in our communities, in our nation and in our world. And yet, while it is still dark, miracles are already beginning, already starting to stir, just about to burst from the tomb. So, do not be discouraged or afraid. Instead, get ready to join the shouts.

Alleluia! Christ is risen! Christ is risen indeed!



EASTER SERMON

APRIL 12, 2020

Acts 10:34-43 Peter – God shows no partiality. Whoever believes in him and receives him is forgiven his sins. If you say you believe and keep on sinning, you are a liar.

Psalm 118:1-2, 14-24 Give thanks~his steadfast love endures forever. "this is the day the Lord has made let us rejoice and be glad in it.

Colossians 3:1-4 If you're raised with Christ, you are a new person. So stop your bad self.

John 20:1-18 Mary Magdalene discover Jesus is not in the tomb. Peter , and "the other disciple (probably John) discover Jesus is not in the tomb. They run off but Mary stays. Jesus appear to her "Do not hold me (tell re mom), tell the others"

Easter is not about bunnies, chicks or children in their pretty spring clothes. There is nothing Christlike about dying eggs or eating hollow chocolate. The celebration we have for Easter has one reason: Except for Easter Sunday, Easter is to horrible to tell children. It is violent, hateful, dirty, sweaty, mournful and bloody, but dressed in pastels and flowers. How are we supposed to explain this to our children? "A fine, gentle human being was viciously murdered and that's how Christianity was born, dear." What do we do with this?

Here's what. His death and His resurrection are not the end of the story. The story doesn't end at all. It continues with you, with us, with all who love and with all who work for justice and mercy. As disciples of Christ we are taught to emulate his way in every situation and to plea forgiveness when we miss the mark. And forgiveness comes ~ from Christ who forgave all from the cross.

Go and love Easter. Embrace the love that didn't die or couldn't die now or ever. Amen.
